The Castro favorite that recently opened in San Jose's Willow Glen dazzles first-timers with its ceiling-to-floor displays of handles, pulls, and knobs, ranging from the ultra-modern to the decidedly eclectic. Conceived by San Francisco interior designer Lou Ann Bauer, the shops offer thousands of choices—knobs shaped like cue balls, mah-jongg pieces, and even Hanukkah dreidels.

[San Mateo] • Guarded by a life-sized stuffed bear in a green apron, **Wisnom Hardware** in downtown San Mateo is hard to miss. Inside the service-oriented hardware heaven are little home luxuries like sterling silver baby cups, turkey fryers, and panini grills. This isn't Home Depot: You can't get lost, there's no lumber aisle, and the prices sure aren't discount. But the staff knows how to take care of its customers.
